

Here is the brief for Friday 16 July 2021.


Command Structure - Gold, Silver and Bronze stood up With the beginning of the third wave of coronavirus, NHS Grampian and our Health and Social Care Partnerships have re-introduced the command and control (decision making) structure that we had during previous waves. This involves the re-establishment of our Gold, Silver and Bronze Command centres. By putting this structure in place we are best able to support everyone to make decisions quickly, respond to issues effectively and make sure that we are all aware of exactly what the impact of things like staff isolation requirements are having on our system. We will continue to keep you updated as to where we are through the Daily Brief.

I also just wanted to take a moment to talk about what we mean when we speak about ‘our system’: essentially it is a short-hand way of saying ‘all health and social care’ in Grampian. By standing up our command structure we can better understand how the whole ‘system’ is working and where the greatest pressures are. For example, understanding what the pressures are on care homes and Care at Home, means that we can take account of those pressures when planning discharges etc. The reverse is true too - our community based colleagues are working very hard to free up capacity and ensure that we are all working to the best of ‘our system’s’ abilities.

We are well aware that the pressure is mounting in every part of ‘our system’; from ARI to GP practices, from Community Hospitals to Care at Home, and we must, as we have done previously do all we can to keep our patients safe and well cared for and we cannot do that without you. So from us all a huge and heartfelt thank you for your continuing commitment, care and compassion.

Grampian data Here is the local update for today, including the 7-day rolling positivity rate. As a reminder, this rate is arrived at by dividing the number of positive tests in the past 7 days by the number of tests carried out in the past 7 days. Repeat tests are included in both categories. The figure for the “daily number of new people tested” is only for the number of tests for people who have not been tested previously. As noted in the diagram below, we have been advised the testing data may be incomplete.
