New COVID-19 variant As you may have seen today, a new variant of COVID-19 has been identified in Scotland. BA.2.86 is an emerging variant and is currently under further investigation. COVID-19 treatment line The telephone number for our COVID-19 treatment line for those in the highest risk groups is changing. From tomorrow (1 September) the number will be 01224 556527. Callers will be asked to leave contact details to receive a call back from one of the team. This phone number is **NOT** for urgent medical advice, general health enquiries or vaccination. People are **ONLY** eligible to be assessed for treatment if **ALL** the following apply:

- you're aged 12 or over
- you have symptoms of coronavirus that started in the last 5 days that **aren't getting better**
- you're in a group who are deemed to be at highest risk of getting seriously ill from coronavirus
- you've tested positive for coronavirus

RAAC update Specialist surveys are continuing to take place in the 54 buildings – or parts of buildings – identified as potentially containing Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RACC). Inspections were made in Aberdeen last week, across Moray sites this week, and in Aberdeenshire next week. Thank you to everyone involved for their co-operation and support. Formal reports will follow once the surveys are completed, and we will share a full update in due course. However, if we receive initial verbal feedback which suggests immediate action is required, our teams will liaise directly with any area affected. Nursing opportunities Interested in a career in nursing? Here is information on two alternative routes into training:

1.Return to Practice Has your NMC registration lapsed, and you want to return to work as a nurse or midwife? The return to practice is course is suitable for those who have previously been registered with the NMC, including nurses (of all branches), midwives and those previously on the SCPHN register. We run cohorts in February and September, which begin with a 7-week theory block before commencing clinical placement hours. If you want to find out more then come along to our information session, which

2.Become a Registered Nurse with the Open University They offer a four year, part-time, programme blending online and practice-based learning, leading to a qualification in adult, mental health, learning disability, or children and young people nursing. To be eligible, you must have a permanent post with NHS Grampian, working a minimum of 26 hours/week, have numeracy and communications skills at SCQF Level 5 or equivalent, and have your line manager's support.
